What are the implications of sexting?

FACTOR SEXTING

You COULD be put on the Sex Offenders Register which could affect all future employment



Sending a sexually explicit photo of someone under 18, is ILLEGAL, even if you are sending one of yourself



You can get a bad reputation and be called names like Slag

YOUR photo can go around the world in seconds

Your computer or phone may be confiscated by the police



A 14-year-old boy has been added to a police intelligence database after sending a naked picture of himself to a female friend, raising concerns that teenagers could become unfairly criminalised for innocent behaviour.

The boy, who has not been named, has been warned that if he ever applies for a job that required advanced criminal record checks, for example if he wanted to work with children, the incident could be "flagged".

Police told him and his mother that they were now required to submit a **crime report** when investigating such matters, even if the person involved had not been arrested or charged.

The file, which records the crime as making and distributing an indecent image, will remain active for a minimum of ten years.

The teenager had taken an explicit photograph of himself in his bedroom and sent it to a girl he was "flirting with" via Snapchat on his mobile phone.

The popular app allows users to send pictures and videos that destruct a few seconds after they have been seen by the recipient.

But the images can be saved by taking a screenshot. And in this case, the girl shared it with friends, who eventually brought it to the attention of the school, in the north of England.
