

Subject Overview Geography – Year 11

Students will further enhance their knowledge and understanding of key geographical concepts through topics, such as changing economic world. Several topics will deepen pupils understanding of themes taught in Yr10, such as hot deserts and tectonic hazards. Students will continue to refine their fieldwork skills through the investigation of a human enquiry by collecting and analysing data. Students will examine a range of place specific case studies in a greater level of sophistication, such as London, Nigeria and Rio.
